

Year 5 and 6 students who had recently taken the Youth Chinese Test (YCT) were given a special treat. Visiting our school were the Co-Director of the Lancaster University Confucius Institute, Professor Yang, and the Lancaster University Confucius Institute's Manager, Colette Webb. Through the Institute, local schools can experience unique lessons taught by teachers from China, who help teach the Chinese language and culture. The YCT is a well-recognized certificate-based qualification for children under the age of fifteen. Achieving this certificate can be a great addition to any resume, and the skills learned from taking the test may give children confidence in learning other languages. Moreover, there are often opportunities for YCT or HSK holders to travel to Asia (HSK tests are for any age group but mostly recommended for over 14 years of age), either through scholarships or other programs with the university.
