During Mandarin lessons, Foundation and Key Stage 1 students have made remarkable progress in learning how to express their family members in Mandarin. Additionally, they have impressed us with their rendition of the popular song 'Head, Shoulders, Knees, and toes' in Mandarin.

Moving onto Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2, these students have dedicated time to revisiting colours and animals in Mandarin. Moreover, they delved into the intriguing world of Traditional Peking Opera and discovered the secret symbolic meaning behind different colours. In Peking Opera, actors, and actresses on stage wear special decorative masks. The colours portrayed on the masks reflects the characters personalities. For instance, red signifies loyalty, black represents honesty, white conveys mistrust, and blue indicates a devious nature.

The students have shown great enthusiasm and curiosity in exploring this cultural aspect of Mandarin learning, broadening their understanding of traditional Chinese arts and symbolism.

Key Stage 2 students also had the opportunity to reinforce their numerical skills while also exploring the concept of days of the week in Mandarin.
